- INCUMBENT ADVANTAGE: 80%
- PRIMARIES AND CAUCUSES (15-30% PARTICIPATE)
  - CLOSED V. OPEN, BLANKET PRIMARY, SPLIT TICKET,
  - IOWA, NEW HAMPSHIRE (FRONT LOADING), AND SUPER TUESDAY
- PARTY CONVENTIONS: DIFFERENT SATES DIFFERENT SYSTEMS
  - DISTRICTS, WINNER TAKE ALL, PROPORTIONAL
- THE GENERAL ELECTION: SWING STATES
- ELECTORAL COLLEGE
- B. WINNER-TAKE-ALL






### What the Oregon Legislature Could Look Like with Mixed Member Proportional Voting










